Q4. Where does your [x]-year-old child learn swear words? *Select all that apply.*

1. From me
2. Other family members
3. Friends or classmates
4. Music, TV, videos
5. Other

Q5. Why do you think your [x]-year-old child uses swear words? *Select all that apply.*

1. To fit in with other kids
2. To get attention
3. Habit – doesn't really think about it
4. To be funny
5. That's just the way kids talk these days

Q6. Have you done any of the following to limit your [x]-year-old child's exposure to swearing? *Select all that apply.*

1. Try to limit my own swearing
2. Prohibit certain music, movies, videos
3. Discourage friendships with certain kids
4. Ask others not to swear in front of kids
5. Other
